Classical Conversations

Welcome Classical Conversations and Nicole Moncada, Director KCMetro North



Starting August 24, 2020, Classical Conversations will be using our facility to launch their KC Metro North location under the leadership of Nicole Moncada. We thought you would like to know a little more about the program and director.

Tell me a little about yourself and how you came to be in KCMO.

I am a wife and a mother of two boys ages 7 and 5. I love to read, spend time with my family, visit with friends (new and old), work on home projects, and marvel at the work of God. I am a recent transplant from Southern California. My family moved to Missouri to be near my parents and we landed in KC when my husband was hired as an electrician for the City of Kansas City. We homeschool our two boys using Classical Conversations resources and I now serve as Director of Classical Conversations KC Metro North.

Why would my family choose to attend Classical Conversations?

Classical Conversations is a resource for families to homeschool their children. Our approach includes three C's: Classical, Christian, Community. We use a classical approach for education, with a biblical worldview, and we meet in communities to encourage and support one another.

The classical approach to education is from the Trivium (Latin for "three roads") and is made up of three pathways that help children learn any subject. The first road is Grammar: along this road, children exercise core habits of naming, attending, memorizing, expressing, and storytelling; and in so doing they build a foundation of knowledge. The next road is Dialectic: along this road students learn to use their knowledge to gain understanding. The third road is Rhetoric where students are on a path to use and apply knowledge and understanding to discern the true, best, and most valuable use of things; they can persuade, defend ideas, and teach.

One of our key verses is Proverbs 24:3, "By wisdom a house is built, and by understanding it is established; and by knowledge the rooms are filled with all precious and pleasant riches." At Classical Conversations, we believe education is a means to know God. We desire for our children to grow in knowledge, understanding and wisdom so their lives will be filled with the richness of knowing God and that they will share this glorious richness and make God known.

We do all this within community to have fellowship, accountability, support and encouragement along the homeschool journey.

Report of Session Meeting - July 26, 2020

The meeting opened with prayer. Pastor Luke led a devotional on the things we must consider during this pandemic.

Pastor Luke shared information from the book Replant Roadmap, and the need to create a launch team including session members, congregation members, and others in our Christian community as we move toward our replant. A first draft of a replant proposal, team covenant, and team member assessment were given to the Elders for review and feedback. The importance of allowing adequate time to build this team and to provide for ongoing and open communication by all members of the congregation was discussed. A Congregational meeting is planned for August 16, to share information and elect a nominating committee. Another is planned in October to approve new officers and review progress. It was decided that in addition to these, regular town hall meetings should be held to facilitate dialogue among all church members, share information, and review our progress.

Session had approved a delay of reopening the church via online discussions until September 6. After some discussion regarding in-person meetings of the Knowing God study and other Sunday School sessions, it was decided a survey of members would be sent out to best determine how to proceed.

A proposal from Northside Fellowship, a church plant group commissioned by Northland Baptist Church, for use of our basement as a meeting place this fall, was presented to the Elders. Session will prayerfully review the information, gather additional information, and discuss this further at our next meeting.

Session approved the use of the building by existing groups, including Scout troops and the Classical Conversations program, with compliance of the Mayor's orders and our St Luke clean and care policies. Groups will be asked to sign a Covid-19 liability release waiver. Requests for individual uses of the building were approved with all church and local policy guidelines followed and no food or drink service at this time.

Donna Shetler reported on the progress of the cleaning and set-up of education rooms with an August 24 completion goal. Nineteen volunteers have completed background checks for child safety. She has developed a self-study that volunteers in the nursery and working with children will complete prior to work with the children. After multiple meetings with the KC Parks Department and church leaders, it was decided that Art in the Park is cancelled for this summer/fall. The goal is to offer this program in 2021.

Report Of Session - Continued

Team reports were shared:

Christian Education (Janice Stewart and Al Steed) has been hard at work preparing classrooms and planning for reopening. Two work days were held on July 18 and 20. Open Table discussions will continue via Zoom.

Hospitality (Darlene Lewis) Social distancing guidelines have interfered with church events. OpenTable meals are set to resume in October, if safe at that time.

Personnel and Placement (Pat Schoenrade) welcomed the new Technology and Media coordinator Lester Page July 8. Some interviews have begun for the Connections and Youth internship and Pat invites referrals from the congregation. Identifying persons and a process for responding to alarm calls, continued oversight of the janitorial service, records retention processes, and staff evaluation processes are in the works.

Missions and Outreach (Pastor Luke) is considering some fall and spring outreach events in light of the cancellation of the Art in the Park program to connect with community children and families. The St. Luke Mission Fund has been dispersed to our designated missions, and the team recommended that \$2000.00 from the remaining funds be used to support EPC missionaries Emory and Lizzy Widener in planting a church in Southeast Asia. Session approved this.

Worship (Debbie Blackman) has been evaluating and making adjustments to drive-in worship with the delay of reopening. It was decided that initially when church reopens, choir will be resumed with bi-monthly practices and one performance a month. Ensembles and solos will be used to fill out the music along with the praise team.

Building and Grounds (Don Smith) Bids for window tinting on the large single-paned windows along the south and east hallways to reduce heating and cooling concerns and preserve the new flooring were shared. A bid from ProtintKC was approved by Session. Session also approved the replacement of the air-conditioning unit for the Choir room which failed last week.

Stewardship (Kim Smedley) The statement of the church financial position, activities, and budget were reviewed. Contributions have been impacted by the pandemic. \$10,000 has been received from the General Assembly for replanting efforts, with \$10,000 coming soon from the Great Plains Presbytery. Paycheck Protection Program loan funds have been used, and documentation paperwork for forgiveness is in process.

The meeting was closed in prayer.
