

Happy mid-summer, beloved of Christ! I hope this message finds you well.

I want to update you on some wonderful developments. Recently we applied for a "revitalization grant" via our denomination, the Evangelical Presbyterian Church. These funds are for churches that are invested/doing revitalization and replanting. They match our church's investment with either a \$2,500, \$5,000, or \$10,000 grant. We applied for the \$10,000 grant praying they would see our needs and get behind the vision.

Our presbytery (regional churches) helped assist us in forming our proposal. The executive team loved what we are doing in replanting as "GlenHaven" that they, too, want to give us another \$10,000 to help accomplish our goals! Can you believe that? Praise God!

I then received a direct call from the stated clerk (Jeff Jeremiah) of the EPC, saying that we have been approved for the \$10,000 grant from General Assembly (our highest governing body). Jeff told me directly that they are overjoyed at our vision for GlenHaven and to "keep up the good work." That means we are receiving \$20,000 from our denomination to encourage us in our replanting work! Will you praise God with me? He is our provider!

Therefore, I am passing on the word to "keep up the good work!" God is on the move among us, and He is confirming our direction.

Hebrews 6: 10-11, "God is not unjust, after all – and he'd have to be if he forgot your work, and the love you showed for his name, and all the service you have rendered and are still rendering to his holy people. I want to encourage each one of you to show the same energetic enthusiasm for the task of bringing your hope to its full, assured goal."

Do for the few what you wish you could do for the many.

Outreach thrives on prayer.

Outreach is a life-long commitment to Matthew 28:18-20

Mr. Kalulu sat by the sunny window sipping his hot tea. Wisps of steam streamed around his face as he closed his eyes and enjoyed the hot liquid. I had seen Mr. Kalulu in the elevator a few times. He held his eyes straight ahead and always held on to the stainless steel handrail that was attached to the side walls of the elevator. I didn't want to stare, but the scars on his face were so prominent and thick. His face looked like leather. It seemed like smiling would cause the scars to break open. On this particular day, there was only one seat left in the lunchroom. It was across from Mr. Kalulu. He looked me straight in the eyes and signaled to sit across from him. This would be the beginning of a friendship with a man who embodied the calling of "do for the few."

Mr. Kalulu was eloquent and knew his Bible. Over the years, I would learn about his harrowing work for Prison Fellowship International (PFI) in the country of Nigeria. He was an activist for prison reform driven by the torture and pain he had endured while incarcerated. His cause was the brutality Christian pastors were subjected to. He was a peaceful protestor raising money to make sure these pastors had food while incarcerated. From time to time, he raised enough money for a medical person to enter the prison to check on the pastors. It was on a fateful day when Mr. Kalulu went into the prison to minister to his friends that he was tricked and ended up in prison. Over our months of discussions, he shared about the atrocities he endured and the reason for the thick, horrible scars on his dark black skin. He had been burned with hot knives for sharing the gospel and protecting Christian pastors who were thought to be the enemy. Mr. Kalulu had been rescued from the prison, along with other Christians, when activists stormed the prison and freed everyone. Everyone except one pastor. And it was this man that Mr. Kalulu asked me to pray and fast for his release. This was the beginning of months of prayer for a man I didn't know except for hearing the anguish of Mr.

Kalulu, who feared his friend was being brutalized because he was the only Christian who didn't get out.

Mr. Kalulu's eventual trip to the United States to work for Prison Fellowship International (PFI) was not by "usual" means. For two weeks, he was transported across the country in an oil drum. Then he travelled in a livestock truck (with the livestock) until he was finally on a small plane heading to a major airport, where finally he would be on the plane to the US. Until the plane took off, he knew he was a fugitive and would be made an example of if he was apprehended.


Mr. Kalulu and I would meet regularly for "tea and prayer". He shared with me that PFI was helping with negotiations to have the one remaining pastor freed. He also shared that he was saving his salary to help this pastor once he was released. Little did I know that within a month of this conversation, I would be having "tea and prayer" with Mr. Kalulu and the pastor we had prayed for over the many months. Mr. Loki was very tall and emaciated. He was just so full of joy about being free. And, he was full of praise for God's protection in spite of the same thick, scars on his face. He thanked me profusely for praying for him as if I had given him millions of dollars to secure his release. Over time, when we met for "tea and prayer" I learned that Mr. Kalulu had been named by Mr. Loki. Kalulu meant "gift from God". When I asked Mr. Loki why he gave Mr. Kalulu that name he said, "because he would risk his life for me. After everyone else escaped, I was the only one left. The suffering was great, the hunger continuous but I knew Kalulu would be working to help me. If I would get out, it would be because Kalulu had given up everything he owned to secure my release. If none of that happened, I knew Kalulu would be praying for me to be able to live for Christ in that prison...to carry the light in that dark hellhole. To Kalulu, I am important. He showed me how much God loves me by the way he cared about me. He has done that for the others who were imprisoned." I asked Mr. Loki how many pastors were released. I thought he would say dozens or perhaps, hundreds, and the answer shocked me. "Two. There were two of us who worked with Kalulu. He encouraged us in the ministry. He worked while we provided ministry. He supported our families financially and sacrificially. He was our "gift from God."

Mr. Kalulu embodied the idea of "do for the few." His love, support, and encouragement of two very brave pastors in Nigeria is a heroic story of selflessness and courage.

Report From Session

Session Report - June 22, 2020

After a time of opening prayer and devotion, the Session discussed the following business:

- Introductions were made with the directors of Classical Conversations, a Christian homeschool cooperative. Plans for their use of the building for twelve sessions this fall and twelve more in the spring were discussed. The leaders shared their interest in supporting the work of this congregation, and invited us to participate in Open Houses scheduled for later this fall.
- Pastor Luke shared the progress of the EPC Revitalization Grant process, and indicated that the Presbytery has indicated their interest in offering support as well.
- Reopening in August, as well as beginning the process for the 2021 relaunch were
 discussed. A cleaning day will be planned soon, and Congregational meetings will be
 scheduled as soon as possible to share plans with everyone. Plans for a Church prayer walk,
 fall classes, and the beginning of Open Table meals in October were also shared. Forum
 class is scheduled to begin meeting again on August 16, and the Mary class will resume in
 September.
- Janice Stewart and Debbie Blackman shared ideas and progress of the Honor Wall
 committee. Alonda Forde, Pam Payne, and Jo Dillingham have agreed to serve on this team
 with them. They are in the preliminary stages of gathering information and planning a wall
 display and a gathering prior to the relaunch in 2021 highlighting the history of this church.
- Session heard a report from Donna Shetler regarding her efforts to secure grants for outreach projects, and the planning for the Art in the Park program beginning August 19.
- A Congregational Meeting to elect a nominating committee will be scheduled for August 16 (pending any changes in Covid-19 status) following worship. Pam and Dennis Bailey have volunteered to serve as the representatives from the Board of Deacons, and Janice Stewart agreed to serve with Debbie Blackman as Elder representatives. Information on the outreach that has been going on all summer will be shared as well, along with plans for Art in the Park and fall activities.
- Don Smith shared that the painting has been completed and flooring installation was beginning. (It has already been completed as of this report!).
- The financial report was shared, with the status of the investment accounts showing some rebuilding. Congregational giving has been impacted by the Covid-19 changes to worship. It was decided to begin taking offering with safety precautions at drive-in church for the convenience of members.
